CEO's Report

I am pleased to provide you with an update on our progress since the last year's CEO Report for Country & Outback Health. We have been actively working on various aspects of our organisation, focusing on new service delivery, office upgrades, staff training, and internal operational improvements.

Our newly-released Care Finder Service for Older People has officially launched across the state, with high initial uptake throughout our regions, including our partner organisations in the Adelaide Hills, Murray Mallee and Riverland.

We have also been reviewing and expanding our NDIS services as a Registered NDIS Provider. This expansion is not only exciting for CObH but also highly beneficial for our communities. We are committed to providing quality services to individuals under the NDIS, and our efforts in this area continue to thrive.

In line with our growth and expansion, we have relocated our Whyalla office to a larger, more suitable building. Situated between the Whyalla Secondary College and TAFE, the new office location will help us effectively promote our services to the community and enhance our operations.

We have taken over the Quorn Medical Practice, streamlining its operations with new staff, improved signage, updated record-keeping systems, and updated processes. Although we are facing some delays in having permanent GPs on board, we have arranged for Locum Doctors to serve the Quorn community until our full-time, local GPs are available.

Additionally, to improve our service reach into regional communities, we have established a Metro Hub in Port Adelaide. This office serves as a working environment for our metro-based staff to deliver tele-health services to traditionally underserved regions. By leveraging technology, we aim to provide better access to healthcare services for individuals in remote areas.

I continue to be proud and humbled by how dedicated and professional our staff are, and their ability to maintain care for our clients as paramount priority. Together, we will continue to achieve new milestones and drive the growth of our organisation to better serve our communities.





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Quorn Medical Practice

In late 2022, Country & Outback Health assumed the operational ownership of the Quorn Medical Practice (formerly Kanyaka Surgery), following the retirement of long-serving GP Tony Lian-Lloyd from the Practice and ushering in a new era for the local community.

Access to quality healthcare is the bedrock of any thriving community. It's not merely about treating ailments; it's about fostering a sense of security, trust, and overall well-being among residents. With the operational reins passing over to Country & Outback Health, the Quorn community found assurance in the continuation of this essential service.

One of the significant concerns during any change in healthcare management is the potential disruption

of services. However, Country & Outback Health, in collaboration with the Rural Doctors Workforce Agency (RDWA) and the Flinders and Upper North Local Health Network (FUNLHN), ensured a seamless transition of service and placement of Locum GPs until permanent local GPs could commence practicing.

The continuation of healthcare services at Quorn Medical Practice under the stewardship of Country & Outback Health is not just a matter of administrative transition; it's a lifeline that ensures the Quorn community has the assurance that its well-being is in caring, capable hands, where the legacy of good health and community support will endure for generations to come

Our Year in Review

CObH L.E.A.P. Update



In April 2020, Country & Outback Health called for expressions of interest from our communities to form our Lived Experience Advisory Panel (LEAP)

A person with a lived experience has gained the knowledge and understanding of a health issue or used the system to get assistance and / or support. This includes experience of living with a mental health illness, living with a disability, caring for a family member or friend with either of these.

The purpose of our LEAP group is to provide a forum for people with lived experience to be a voice for the community on things such as quality of care & service delivery.

One of our members, Harold Flam, shared their knowledge and experience of Pronouns with our staff; what are they, why are they important and how to use them. This forms part of our organisational commitment for inclusitvity and welcoming all people.

Our LEAP group have been meeting regularly via ZOOM and met in person last November discussing many items including appropriate and respectful terminology on our website and client forms, input on tenders from a consumer experience using their unique perspective and understanding to provide support, guidance and provide practical advice by drawing on their own experiences.

Whyalla Office Relocation



Country & Outback Health Whyalla successfully transitioned into our more spacious and convenient location at 127 Nicolson Avenue in August 2023.

This significant step came in response to continued growth within our organisation and to meet the increasing demand for our services, leading us to outgrow our previous office on Moran Street. Relocating was not just necessary but a vital step to accommodate our growing staff numbers and ensure we could effectively deliver our services to the Whyalla community.

Our dedicated team worked hard to ensure a seamless transition with minimal disruptions to our clients or our ability to deliver essential services.

This move represents a new chapter in our commitment to serving the Whyalla community. It allows for continued growth and expansion of services, and we are excited to see our valued clients in our new establishment.

Metro Hub Launch



The COVID-19 pandemic had a profound impact on our traditional face-to-face service delivery. However, it also provided us with a significant opportunity to explore the use of technology to continue and expand service delivery into our communities.

This opportunity developed into a strategic goal within our CObH strategic business plan. Initially, we scoped and developed a business plan for a virtual hub, enabling diverse health services and providing telehealth services via virtual-based positions.

The second phase of this strategic goal involved developing this virtual hub into a physical location based in Adelaide, where we could provide a professional and secure site for our telehealth workers to conduct their appointments.

In late 2022 we secured a location in Port Adelaide, and our metro-based staff commenced working from the location in early 2023 to deliver services into regional South Australian communities.

This Metro Hub represents a massive achievement for CObH, granting us the flexibility and expansion opportunities to enhance our regional service delivery through the use of technology. It also plays a crucial role in reducing wait times for those in remote areas who do not have easy access to mental health services.

In recognition and support for Harmony Week, Country & Outback Health developed and shared a series of staff profiles that celebrated the rich tapestry of cultures within our organisation. Social Worker Grant Uni SA

This extended timeline will provide ample opportunity to promote the grant to second-year Nursing students, encouraging them to consider placements with CObH in 2024.

Uni SA Student Placements



We were delighted to welcome two cohorts of Podiatry students from the University of South Australia, embarking on enriching placements with Country & Outback Health.

The first group, consisting of Andy, Eleni, Jedd, and Savanna, commenced their training under the expert guidance of our senior Podiatrist, Julie Yap, in Whyalla. During the four week placement, these students engaged in detailed biomechanical assessments, focusing on the feet, ankles, and lower legs of volunteer staff members. As part of their hands-on experience, they also crafted simple orthotic devices tailored to the specific needs of the volunteers.

The second group of fourth-year Podiatry students from UniSA also joined us for a 4-week placement under the mentorship of Senior Podiatrist Julie Yap and with valuable support from Loc and Chi of the IPHCS team. Hien, Husein, Samvedna, and Yaseen embarked on a journey across the Eyre Peninsula during their placement, connecting with our community members, exploring the local landscapes, and gaining invaluable practical experience.

At Country & Outback Health, we are dedicated to providing a supportive and hands-on learning environment for the next generation of podiatrists. These placements not only enrich the education of the students but also contribute to the overall well-being of the communities we are privileged to be a part of.

the Resilience Project. This organisation promotes mental health and well-being through Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness.





Mia Speed, a 17-year-old Wirangu woman from Ceduna, created this meaningful piece, showcasing her pride and passion for her cultural heritage.
